## FROM OUR RELIEVING PRINCIPAL

Hello to our wonderful Kariong Mountains School Community.

A busy term is evolving with transition and celebrations high on the KMHS agendas...

**Congratulations to Year 12** on completing their HSC and on their respectful celebration on Monday night at their formal. I'd like to also recognise the dedication and commitment of Megan Miller as Year advisor to the cohort for six years. Monday night evidenced the special support and understanding of each student that she has fostered, and also the respect the year group has for her. HSC results will be issued on the 16<sup>th</sup> of December, with a celebration BBQ being organised for that date.

#### **NSW DoE Curriculum reform**

2023 is bringing the beginning of a major curriculum reform across the NSW Department of Education. As a part of implementation, schools have been asked to plan for 5 hours release time for each staff member, each term for three years, to assist with professional learning and planning for implementation. I am currently working through the implications of this with the executive to address the PL needs of staff in 2023. Further information will be provided to the school community as the planning evolves.

#### **Attendance - Parent Survey**

As discussed in my last newsletter report, KMHS is currently planning and implementing strategies to improve student attendance. Part of this planning is surveying our parent community; a survey link was e-mailed to all parents in Years 7-10 last week. Can I please ask that you take the time to complete this survey, as this will assist in future planning for improvement of student attendance and thus learning outcomes. Your support is appreciated.

### **Year 7 2023 Transition**

The KMHS transition team has been working extremely hard with our Partner schools to ready Year 6 students as they move into Year 7 2023. Of notable recognition for their work to date is Mr Flakus , the Year 7 Advisor for 2023 and Mrs Doyle our transition and LaST teacher. We look forward to meeting all students at **Orientation Day on Thursday 24th November.** 

## **STARS Assembly Term 4**

A significant highlight for me was to attend the final STARS assembly for 2023 last week. It was a privilege to see the students recognised for their hard work and application to their subjects by their teachers. Another highlight was meeting some parents and seeing the KMHS community through the school gates again.

Our students and parents /carers are to be congratulated on this achievement.

### **Careers Pathway Class**

An exciting initiative for some of our Year 9 into 10 students is taking shape for 2023.



The Careers Pathways Class of 2023 will allow selected students in Year 10 to engage in a vocational pathway whilst still achieving their Year 10 ROSA. Students in this class will gain a nationally recognised qualification to add to their résumé whilst still at school. Students will participate in a variety of selected programs, undertake micro-credentialling courses such as the *White Card*, *Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA)* and *Responsible Conduct of Gambling (RCG)* as examples. Mentoring, site visits to workplaces and work experience are all embedded as part of the program for this class.

P-TECH, as part of IBM, will deliver mentoring sessions and guest speakers from industry. There is opportunity to work with our SBAT Engagement Officer to allow students to upskill and apply for *School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships* (SBATs) if so desired.

Students will be better prepared for the challenges in obtaining apprenticeships, traineeships and jobs in the future, giving them a competitive edge for the current labour market. This program has been developed as a future-focused learning model to equip students as 21st century learners at all exit points from school.

An information evening for parents and students will be held in the school library on Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> November from 6:00 to 6:30pm in the library to give further details and the procedure for making an application to enrol in this class.

- 10 Live longer


Now, you may have read about the 2022 Naplan state-wide results that show one in seven Year 9 boys are reading at a record low.

SMH article: Reading standards for Year 9 boys at record low

At KMHS our 2022 Naplan Reading results have shown significant improvement and were above like schools and the State.

**NAPLAN** is a snapshot of one day in the year of a student and while it does give us valuable data, it does not tell the whole picture. Our teachers are committed to improving the educational outcomes of our students.

In English we look at a range of written texts with a term focus on a novel study in each 7-10 program. Additionally, through working with the Literacy Coordinator, we have introduced book boxes which are a novel of the student's choice, in a sustained reading and comprehension program.



The library is always available to help choose suitable reading books too. In my research on this complex topic, I have found how valuable it is for parents to continue to read to and listen to our students reading, well into their teens. So, let's look up from our screens and look into a good book.

# Aboriginal Education Check-in Class

We were very appreciative to have *Stu McMinn* with us to take us on a guided cultural tour of Wollombi National Park. Stu shared his experiences learning about his culture, what matters, and the importance of being humble and respectful on these sites.

Some of the sandstone carvings had worn away, but Stu was able to share from memory the shapes and stories with a strong moral warning from thousands of years ago. After a traditional smoking ceremony, we went to a massive lookout and heard from Stu all about Mount Yengo and what makes it one of the most sacred sites in NSW. We then travelled to a huge rock platform where Stu explained the meaning of the carvings and their significance today. We then had lunch before walking to a cave with cultural significance, which faces Mount Yengo and has many charcoal-splattered handprints. The students broke into dance after lunch with Stu on the boomerangs.




