### From our Principal

I hope that this newsletter continues to see our families well and looking forward to changes in regulations within NSW set to be in place by the end of February. An email from the school will follow with

the Department's advised changes to operational settings for schools.

#### **Update on RAT Testing**

The usage of rapid antigen tests in schools will move to align to community settings of 'symptomatic testing'. After 25th February, students will be provided with a total of 8 tests per student to use as needed for the remainder of term. Students can use their final bundle of RATs should they be symptomatic or if there are cases in their class/cohort.

#### Stage 6 Webinar - PowerPoint

This has now been placed on the <u>school's website</u> for parents, who were unable to attend. Please do not hesitate to contact myself or Mrs Hawker if you have any questions about Stage 6 guidelines, credentials and post-school pathways.

#### **Mobile Phone Policy Update**

The school has had an electronic devices policy since its foundation. Over the years, this has been updated to reflect changes in technology. Essentially, though the core of the policy has remained the same, and that is, students should not be using mobile devices during class lessons unless explicitly directed by their teacher. Students not following these instructions are given one warning and then asked to take their phone to the office, where it is looked after for the remainder of the day.

An examination of our incident reports and end of semester student reports indicates that the policy is not always operating as intended. The school has discussed, with the P&C, the possibility of setting up 'Yondr', in which students' phones are placed in pouches for the school day and are unable to use their phone unless the class teacher unlocks the pouch for educational use. A number of schools are using these pouches successfully and have indicated that students are calmer, experience less distractions during lesson time and engage in more play and conversations during the breaks.



Interruptions due to COVID have slowed down our research into this product and its use at KMHS. The existing policy was discussed with students at their year assembly and over the next few weeks, a consistent and focused application of the current guidelines will be applied in all classes. This will allow us to see whether a collaborative effort between students and staff can be effective long-term, thereby not having to look at more restrictive solutions to ensuring that the policy is implemented.

A survey to all students and parents/ carers (will be sent out in the next few weeks) so that we can seek a broad range of opinions on this subject.

We really encourage you to have your say.

Sometimes, it is easy to forget that we are a very young school and only now are we starting to see past students settling into careers, starting families and having adventures in their successful lives post school.

### **Deputy Principal's Report**

Throughout the year, as in previous years, I will include an aspect of our Student Welfare and Discipline Policy in the newsletter. The first mention is our canteen voucher reward process.

#### **Positive Memo Rewards**

On each Wednesday assembly, a student is rewarded with a \$10 canteen voucher. The lucky recipient is randomly drawn from our Compass database of Positive Memos. Students from Years 7 to 9 are eligible for Week A and Years 10 to 12 in Week B.

#### **Elective Subjects**

Elective changes for Years 9 to 11 are now finalised. Any further changes will only be considered for exceptional circumstances. Any timetable concerns are to be directed to me in the first instance. Students in Years 10 and 11 will soon be asked to check and sign their NESA confirmation of entries.

#### **Mobile Phone Policy**

A friendly reminder that mobile phones are to be switched off or put on silent and placed in bags when entering the classroom. They are to remain there until a teacher direction to use them is given. Parents and caregivers are also asked not to ring students during class time. Urgent matters can be communicated through our Front Office.

#### **Assessment Booklets**

Students in Years 10 and 11 have received their assessment booklets for this year. They are important documents containing the rules and schedules. 
#### **2022 Tryouts**
