

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2022



27 MAY - 3 JUNE

#NRW2022

National Reconciliation Week (NRW)

is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for NRW are the same each year; **27 May to 3 June.**

These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey — the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

27 May 1967 On this day, Australia's most successful referendum saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census.

3 June 1992 On this day, the Australian High Court delivered the Mabo decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo's challenge to the legal fiction of 'terra nullius' (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. This decision paved the way for Native Title.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

STARS Assembly: Last Thursday we held our Semester 1 STARS Assembly, a great opportunity to recognise our hardest working students.

With over 120 students receiving the award from our small school population, it is a testament to the positive culture of learning in our classrooms day in and day out.



Understandably, high achieving students get recognised frequently and students requiring extra resources also get the necessary attention. What I really like about the STARS program is that students who consistently apply themselves to the best of their ability are deservedly recognised.

Congratulations, to all recipients and I look forward to seeing even more students being eligible in our Semester 2 presentation.



In summary, students are required to submit an 'Illness / Misadventure Application Form', which is located in their booklet and both staff rooms. This form must be submitted, with relevant documentation; such as a medical certificate, within two days of the assessment task or return to school. There is a flow chart in each of the assessment booklets that explains the process.

In light of the article above, I am currently examining Compass entries for students, who are in danger of not meeting requirements in one or more courses. If a student fails to meet a requirement for an assessment task, or is not achieving to a satisfactory level, parents are notified through an 'N Warning' Letter.

Within the letter are details on how the student can resolve the issue. Continued failure to address the issues identified in the warnings can lead the student being ineligible for that course and be 'N Determined'. This could lead to the student not receiving a RoSA for their particular credential, including the HSC.

Prior to this, recovery plans are put in place to give students every opportunity to redeem themselves.

I will be working closely with the school's careers team, as a voice for the Educational Pathways Program, to help build great pathways and opportunities for students' wanting to combine schooling and work opportunities to assist in achieving their HSC.

The SBAT program is a partnership program designed to provide students in Years 10, 11 & 12 with the opportunities to pursue their career pathways whilst remaining at school. 
