

FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Thirteen years ago, I was appointed the foundation principal of Kariong Mountains High School. During my interview for the position, I stated that I believed the school was meant for me to lead and that I had been

moving through my career to be in this role. I am forever grateful to that interview panel, who saw in me the capacity and passion to lead the school into the great learning institution it is today.

But all good things must come to an end and this is the last newsletter that I will write as principal. After 42 years in teaching and 17 of those as a school principal, I have made the decision to retire.

I usually find it easy to say the words and convey the ideas that I want to get across, but I cannot truly express how privileged I have been to have seen this school grow, watch and share in the joy of our students achieving their dreams, work with a staff that gives so much of their time to support students, and build partnerships with our families and community.

Over the years, we have built our identity as a great school at the grassroots level, and also as a lighthouse school, within the system, for learning innovation.



I could write pages about our humble beginnings before the school was finished being built, our first HSC class in 2014, our slow additions to the trophy cabinet, our expansions in curriculum, the many excursions and activities that have taken place across the years, but then I remember that is exactly what I have been doing in every newsletter, at every event I attend and at any time I have had the opportunity to speak about our school. So, believe it or not, I have actually shortened this article from its first draft!

Over the years, there have been laughs and tears, triumphs and tragedies, but through it all, I have never wavered on the absolute belief that our students are amazing, kind and capable. They deserve to be praised as much as the school that they attend does. Thank you, to all the parents, past and present, who have recognised this. In regards to the disparaging remarks that are made from time to time, many made in ignorance, in retirement I will be free to set the story right. For even in the future, I will always be an advocate and a positive voice for the students and this school.

Finally, I would like to say that I became a teacher to help students learn and see the value of public education in being able to open many doors to future careers. Regardless of background, *education levels* the playing field of life. This was my lived experience and I wanted to help other students also use their education as a stepping stone to better things and bigger dreams. I leave the profession hoping that I have done just that.

Arrive at lessons on time and be prepared to participate in learning.

Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly.

Behave in a safe, considerate and responsible manner, this includes travel to and from school.

Be respectful at all times and cooperate with teacher instructions and learning activities.

Keep the school grounds tidy at all time.

Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our school.

These are also developed in partnership with parents/carers, with support from Aboriginal staff and other specialist school staff to help scaffold Indigenous students' goals into reality.



CAPA: MONEY MOVES

Ever wanted to make money off your unique talent?

In a world of extreme production, consumption, and constant inundation of visual information, it can be hard to appreciate the artistic process of creating an authentic piece of work that is not only recognised and celebrated, but receive remuneration for your talent as well.

At Kariong Mountains High School we have many budding artists in our CAPA (Creative and Performing Arts) classes. Our students in Art, Music and Photography regularly excel in performances and exhibitions within the school and greater community.

A common misconception echoed in conversations with students and young people, is that Visual Arts knowledge is not useful in the 'real world' and the skills and concepts will not support a young person's pathway to higher education, let alone to develop a career path in the creative arts.

Here, at KMHS, we have past and present students, who are challenging this notion. From exhibiting their art in local exhibitions, selling works to private admirers, creating and selling commission work through socials and presenting work to a national audience, here are three fantastic stories of student success at KMHS:

Lana

Lana is a Year 12 Visual Arts student, who has developed her artistic talent and unique practice through the years, completing Visual Arts as a Stage 5 elective and now completing her Body of Work for her HSC.

Lana engages with her audience through a variety of social media platforms including TikTok and Instagram. A highlight for her artist journey, she recalls, was when her TikTok blew up, receiving over 30,000 views from two videos, viewed by people across the world. "It led to 30 commission requests in one day".

In her own time, Lana is busy creating commission artworks for customers. When asked what was it that made her want to start selling her work, she explained "Money. I think it is a good way to start in the profession, by selling my art online". Lana expressed that sharing her art and selling it allowed her to feel valued and recognised for her talent.

Lana's favourite types of commissions to do, are those which are stylised cartoonish caricatures of humans and animals, but she is open to any style that the customer wants. She uses a variety of digital apps to create her works and each piece is individual. Lana has big plans for the future, hoping that her commission business will grow, and she can eventually create art as a full time job.

After the exhibition opened to the public, Coby was contacted through the school to discuss a potential sale for his artwork. This came as a complete surprise to Coby and his mum. He remembers being so excited and shocked that someone had seen his work, loved it so much and wanted to buy it. He recalls feeling proud and accomplished and experiencing an overall ecstatic feeling of being recognised for his talent and storytelling, even mentioning that the customer was kind enough to gift Coby a set of oil pastels in appreciation of his sale.

When asked if he would like to have that opportunity again, Coby smiled with a huge grin and said 'Yes, I would like to sell more of my work'. Coby is currently working on his next artwork which he plans to feature in an upcoming Art exhibition held by Garry Purchase, who is also a spectacular Indigenous artist.

Garry has been collaborating with KMHS's Indigenous Hub group to create a contemporary cultural mural that will be displayed at our school.

Olivia

It is always enjoyable to see our past students from KMHS following their dreams and creating rich visual communication in such a public and ultramodern way. Olivia (class of 2018), was involved in a collaborative artwork displayed on the Cadmans Building during Sydney's world-renowned Vivid light show in 2022. After completing her HSC in Visual Arts, Olivia completed a Bachelor of Media Arts at the University of New South Wales, Sydney.

It is refreshing and inspiring to see young people follow their passion and experience great achievement through persistence and trust. Not only does Visual Arts allow for self-expression, but fosters creative and critical thinking, develops visual communication, and supports collaborative explorations. It takes a brave individual to follow their dreams and successfully express themselves through visual language, possibly one of the oldest languages in history and one that is universally shared and understood.
