RELIEVING DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Over the last couple of newsletters, we have focused on how to get our students wanting to go to school and becoming

engaged with their learning. To that end, we investigate our third core value of *Knowledge*. In the previous two articles we focused on valuing, learning and applying ourselves.

In this article we will explore the third aspect of knowledge – Being Curious!



Albert Einstein often downplayed his talents. One of his many endearing quotes is "I have no special talent. I am only passionately curious."

A number of years ago, I attended an educational conference with the keynote address given by **Dr Karl Kruszelnicki**. He discussed how we are indoctrinated to believe that being able to solve problems is a key to success, however, it is not being able to solve problems that makes us successful, but knowing what questions to ask based on our observations. In other words, developing an inquiry mindset.

As educators, we see our most pleasurable moments when students wrinkle their brows and ask probing questions regarding a concept that intrigues them.

Many of the strategies our teachers use to foster an inquiry mindset come from the principles of formative assessment. These strategies can be as simple as asking a student at the end of a lesson to write down one thing they found curious in the lesson. Another strategy is to get the students to reflect on a Positive from the lesson, a Minus and an Interesting (P.M.I).

So, as educators and parents, how can we foster an inquiry mindset in our children to help them develop the critical learning skills they will need to successfully navigate the adult world? The following suggestions are taken from: https://www.teachthought.com/learning/ inquiry-driven/

1. LET CHILDREN EXPLORE AND LEARN THROUGH PLAY. Again, Albert Einstein famously said 'Play is the highest form of research'. Sometimes just giving students materials and letting them go and see what comes back can open their minds and allow their curiosity to run free.

2. TURN AN ACTIVITY INTO A PROJECT. The principles of project based learning are often employed when students are tasked with creating a product or project and to achieve the product they need to discover what they need to learn to effectively complete their product. At home, getting children to create gifts, cards, theming the house for parties or events can be great ways of getting them to learn along the way. The ASAP program in years 7 and 8 is built on learning via a project or product.

3. THE TEACHER OR PARENT IS NOT THE ONLY EXPERT. I remember often asking my mother how to spell a word and the response 'look it up in the dictionary'. I then had to guess the first letter and work through the dictionary until I found the word. Mum stopped being the expert and allowed me to develop an inquiry skill.

4. CREATE A WONDERWALL. Message boards or chalk boards with post-it notes are great ways to promote inquisitive learning. In a particular class, the teacher introduces the learning intention of the lesson and then gets the students to write a question on a post-it note and place it on the board. At the end of the lesson students collect a random question and answer that question. This is a great strategy for promoting an inquiry mindset.

Hopefully, between teachers and parents we can continue to develop an inquiry mindset in our students and increase engagement by fostering a thirst for knowledge.

From the Maths faculty...

Early in Term 2, Years 7 and 9 completed their NAPLAN numeracy assessment online to demonstrate their understanding of a wide variety of mathematical concepts.

Students performed exceptionally well with an increase of 10% of Year 9 students achieving in the top 2 bands and a 3.5% increase of students in Year 7.

Results also show KMHS students achieving above statistically similar school groups in both Years 7 and 9 and we are extremely proud of their commitment to their studies!!

Huge congratulations, to Ben (*Year 9*) and Abdullahi, Lachlan, Nate, Cooper and Tyler (*Year* 7), who achieved the highest possible band for their numeracy assessment!!
