KOKODA YOUTH CHALLENGE

Myself and 18 other young leaders spent 10 days covering over 150 km of rainforest terrain in Papua New Guinea. We took on the grueling task of walking the *Kokoda Track* to learn and respect the fallen *3826 Australian men and 1 woman*, who laid down their lives for Australia during WWII. We followed what's called *"The Wartime Trail"* which is the exact track the Australians took defending their mates against the Japanese in 1942.

The Track was challenging at times and confronted us all with challenges each day. We had no option, but to overcome the fear, anxiety and worry of walking upwards of ten hours per day, because there was no way out. Some rivers were knee-deep, but some were neck. The bridges were made of one thick tree trunk, if you were lucky, but mostly made up of smaller branches laid along each other and held together with bamboo leaves as twine.

With every obstacle came caution and despair of whether the bridge could hold your weight, but you'd watch the fuzzy wuzzy angel descendants (our porters (the boys)) stroll across them like they were walking down the sidewalk and that had to be enough for you to just overcome it.



The morale throughout the group was never let down as we knew we had to be close and be friends with those who surrounded each other, as there was no one else for ten days. *Lifelong friendships were made*. We all endured the hardest hike in the world together and the support for each other was never doubted by anyone.



Myself and four others were up the front of the pack leading with the front shovel man (FSM) Lenny. We became close with Lenny, a 42 year-old father of three, born and raised in Port Moresby. He led us through the whole trail, making jokes, digging footsteps and saving my life.




To know that young Australian men fought for themselves and their mates on such a gruelling track was just humbling. Seeing the weapon pits that one or two Aussie men would sit in for days, firing at the enemy, whilst getting shot at, was incredible. Also, seeing photos from 1942, of the position we were standing on, was amazing.

I'd recommend anyone of any age that has the drive to get fit enough to take the Kokoda challenge head on and experience history in real life. You need to be in a good physical condition as the trail pushes even the most fit athletes. Passing plaques of deceased trekkers was a massive eye-opener. *May they rest in peace.*
