#### UNIFORM SHOP

Kariong Mountains High School is a uniform school and the expectation is for all students to wear the correct uniform. As parents look to outfit students for the year ahead, please be aware of the following:

- Black leather upper or suede shoes are required not white or canvas. This is a health and safety requirement for students in practical areas and the playground.
- Girls have a choice of school skirt and/or shorts and shirt for their uniform. Leggings are not a uniform item and are not to be worn.
- School hooded jumpers and jackets are available from the uniform shop. Families may purchase a plain blue hooded jumper (no logo) if affordability is a concern.
- Track pants are also available from the uniform shop for cooler months.

Normal uniform shop opening hours are **8-9am on Tuesdays and Fridays**. Additional opening hours for the remainder of this term and January are as follows:

## DISABILITY PROVISIONS

## Disability Provisions for the Higher School Certificate Examinations 2025 are now open!

Disability provisions in the HSC are practical arrangements, designed to help students, who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt to show what they know in an exam room.

Students are eligible to access disability provisions under the following categories:

- **Learning difficulties**
- **Medical disabilities**
- **Hearing and Vision disabilities**

The provisions granted, are solely determined by how the student's exam performance is affected. Eligible students must apply to the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) through the school.

Students who wish to apply for disability provisions should see Mr Treece.

If you are concerned about whether disability provisions apply to your child, you should contact the Learning and Support Team as soon as possible.

We recommend the Casio fx-82AU PLUS II, which you can purchase from most office supply retailers. ## COMMUNITY NEWS & EVENTS

# MOTORISED WHEELED DEVICES

Devices such as electric scooters, skateboards, and hoverboards are ILLEGAL in NSW.

Although a motorised scooter, skateboard, or hoverboard (electric or petrol powered) are considered motor vehicles, they do not satisfy the Australian Design Rules and for this reason, cannot be registered in NSW and are unable to be insured.

These devices cannot be ridden on roads, or road related areas (such as footpaths shared paths and cycleways) in NSW, except on private land.





Anyone caught riding a motorised device on a road or road related area in NSW can face fines starting from \$723



Some electric motorised bicycles known as 'e-bikes' are LEGAL to ride in public in NSW if they comply with certain CONDITIONS.



There are only two types of permitted e-bikes:

- Power-assisted pedal cycles
- Electric power-assisted cycles

BUT they must be designed to be propelled primarily by the rider. They cannot be propelled exclusively by the motor and cannot exceed 25km/h.

Bicycles powered by electric motors are intended only to assist when riding uphill or into a headwind, NOT to be the primary source of propulsion.

Electric powered bicycles which don't comply with these conditions cannot be ridden on roads, or road related areas (such as footpaths shared paths and cycleways) in NSW, except on private land.

Anyone caught riding an illegal electric powered bicycle on a road or road-related area in NSW can face fines starting from \$723
