

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FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

HELLO TO OUR KARIONG MOUNTAINS HIGH SCHOOL COMMUNITY!

Thankyou, to parents and carers for your diligent support of the school uniform, including **black shoes**. Communication last year and the beginning of this year outlined the requirements now for students' footwear. I am aware that some families may have not seen this communication already purchased a different colour shoe. Mr White and myself are encouraging students from these families to **bring a note** and a uniform pass, for the term, will be issued. The school is asking that the upgrade of a student's shoes, when required, **conform to the school policy**, of all black, with leather/suede upper, to be in line with DoE Health and Safety requirements.

YEARS 11 - 12

Term 1 is off to a busy start, especially with Year 11 beginning their Preliminary year for their HSC pathway, and Year 12 almost halfway through their HSC year.

The rigor of senior study is very different to the junior school, and, for some students, the senior course can be challenging.

Positive attendance is critical for students to achieve their full potential at the end of Year 12. Check-in at the beginning of the day is compulsory for all students to attend, and flexible attendance for Year 12 is for periods 4 and 5 only. This time of the day is being used by Year Advisors Mr Hipwell (12) and Ms Richmond (11) and our Stage 6 co-ordinator Mrs Matthew to provide support for all students as they work thorough assessments and also to build a culture of support and achievement.

I thank parents and carers for supporting these initiatives.

Kariong Mountains High School has detailed assessment policies in place to support **senior students**. Copies of these are available on our website. Year 12 received their booklets at the beginning of Term 4 last year and Year 11 received theirs last week, coinciding with the information evening, at which I presented to parents/carers and Year 11 students on NESA (*NSW Education Standards Authority*) requirements for their Stage 6 pathway.



KEY POINTS for students and parents to remember in relation to the Assessment Policy:

- All students are to sign for the assessment book and retain a hard copy.
- Copy of Assessment Policy booklet for each year is available to download from the school website.
- Misadventure: in the event of a major illness or problem occurring, students must see Mr White DP as soon as possible. The student MUST see the DP their FIRST day back at school to apply for a misadventure and submit appropriate paperwork. A medical certificate or statutory declaration needs to be submitted with the paperwork for the task mark to be counted. Examples of the documentation needed are found in the Assessment policy.
- Technology issues are not a valid reason for misadventure. Students must be organised and have a plan of using a USB to back up their work and printing at school if the need arises.
- It is also a good idea to map tasks on a calendar or organiser so that they have a visual reminder of what is needed for time planning. Both assessment schedules include this organisation tool.


Timetable Update

ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS

Welcome back to **English and Drama in 2025**. The English team are Courtney Thompson (HT), Lisa Bell, Danielle Hunt, Stephanie Richmond and Roberta Von Heupt. We look forward to working with our students this year.



Year 7 – are studying a range of picture book texts to identify the elements of Visual Literacy in the unit "A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words." The assessment task is a Picture Book task to



be submitted at the end of the term.

Year 8 – are studying a range of quality poems, to better understand the forms and features of poetry in *"Poetic Pizazz."* The assessment task will be a podcast based on poetry.

Year 9 - are studying a range of "What if???" scenarios as we explore speculative fiction in the unit "Tomorrow Today". The assessment will be an imaginative and reflection writing task.

Year 10 – are reading a novel for the unit "Keen Readers" that explores themes and ideas relevant to a teenage audience, to develop their understanding of themselves and their place in the world. The assessment task will be an imaginative writing task based on their novel.

Year 11 – are understanding what it means to be a senior student and navigate their school, work and personal life balance in their Reading to Write or English and the Workplace units. The assessment task will be due in Week 9.

Year 12 – are into their second term of their HSC with *Advanced, Standard* and *Studies* studying a range of texts including plays, novels, poems, films, song lyrics and visual texts in the units *Textual Conversations; Language, Identity and Culture;* and *MiTunes and English.* The assessment task will be a Half-Yearly Exam in Week 10.

Drama Group - Miss Thompson will be taking Year 8 Drama lessons to develop students' drama skills.

Poetry Incursion Term 3

Further to the success of this incursion last year, the English Faculty has organised another poetry incursion on 16/8/25. We are very aware of the minimal opportunities available for our students to participate in and this group enables us to facilitate a learning event within our school to show our students new ideas. **Poetry In Action** is an innovative touring theatre company, dedicated to unlocking the power of words for everyone. Every student from 7-10, studies poetry texts and speeches throughout the year and this performance could inspire and challenge our students, and assist them in developing their understanding of the language of poems.
