SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Partial attendance has an impact:

Kariong Mountains High School has had a positive start to the year with attendance – thank you, to everyone for your efforts.

A reminder that **students need to be at school before 8:50 am**, to ensure they are in check-in/hub at the start of the school day. As shown in the graphic below, every lost minute has an impact on student learning over time.

Students who arrive late to school are still required to have their partial absence explained.

Winter Uniform: high expectations

We have received great support from our students and families regarding our higher expectations of students wearing full school uniform every day. Thank you, to everyone for your support.

Can I request that parents and carers continue to support our **uniform high expectations**, by ensuring your child has the correct trackpants and school jumper, especially when we switch to winter uniform in the cooler months.

Our uniform has **navy blue** shorts and trackpants for juniors and seniors (*black or grey trackpants are <u>not</u> school uniform*). School branded trackpants are available at the schools' uniform shop. Plain navy blue trackpants are acceptable. **Clothing in other colours or with branding / logos are not allowed**.

Senior students have the option to wear their senior jacket / hoodie. School branded jumpers are available from the uniform shop. Plain, navy blue (no branding/ logo) hooded jumpers are also acceptable.

Additionally, plain black leather upper shoes, are a safety requirement of the school uniform.

The school has a uniform clothing pool, to support any student or family who needs support with school uniform when necessary. Please contact the school if you need assistance.

PBL NEWS

In recent years, Kariong Mountains High School has increasingly recognised the importance of fostering a positive and supportive learning environment, not only for academic success but also for students' overall wellbeing. One of the most impactful initiatives that have been implemented in our school is Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL).



What is Positive Behaviour for Learning?

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is a whole-school approach that focuses on promoting positive behaviour, enhancing students' social skills, and creating an environment where all students can thrive. It is based on the principle that positive reinforcement and clear expectations for behaviour can significantly improve both student conduct and academic performance.

Key components of PBL:

- ★ Clear Expectations
- ★ Explicit Teaching
- ★ Positive reinforcement
- ★ Consistency across the school
- ★ Data-driven decision making

Receiving Positive Memos on COMPASS

PBL focus areas have been created, and throughout the year, students will be receiving positive memos on COMPASS, if they have successfully demonstrated the PBL focus areas. These areas are updated fortnightly.

THE SCIENCE SCOOP

Exciting times in the Science Classrooms! This term has been a whirlwind of hands-on learning and scientific discovery for students across all year groups!

Year 7: Our Year 7 students have been mastering lab safety and equipment use, proudly earning their Bunsen burner licenses. They have had a fantastic start to the year and are looking forward to going to Taronga Zoo early next term, as part of our studies on the classification of living things.

Year 8 students have been exploring life at a **microscopic level**, using microscopes to uncover the hidden world of cells. Their latest challenge is to research and build 3D bacterial cell models. We can't wait to see their creativity in action!

Year 9

91/9GH These classes have been investigating how diseases spread, even culturing bacteria from everyday surfaces—including Mr Sutton's phone, which turned out to be quite the microbial hotspot!

Students have been delving into the atomic world, exploring the language of chemistry and how we create innovative materials. They will finish the term with a practical assessment task, putting their refined scientific skills to the test.

Year 10

10VF Students started the year with a favourite topic—chemical reactions. They're learning about the variety and rules of how elements come together to create something new, with plenty of lab time.

10.2 This class is exploring the genetics of reproduction and how it contributes to the variety of differences between individuals. They've had some great discussions about how features are passed down through generations.

10 (accelerated): This class has been tackling the Year 11 Investigating Science course. The students are finding their stride and developing key scientific skills.



Year 11 Biology

Students have dived into the complexity of cells, from their "organs" known as organelles to the features that allow them to perform amazing functions daily. Mrs Peters has been impressed by their enthusiasm and commitment.

HSC Physics, Biology and Investigating Science

These classes are doubling down in preparation for their upcoming Half Yearly examinations. Keep up the hard work!


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Once you understand the big picture, **split the topic into smaller**, **more manageable chunks**. Think of it like dividing a pizza into slices —it's easier to tackle one piece at a time than trying to eat the whole thing at once.

 Preparing for an essay might involve planning the introduction, body paragraphs, and conclusion separately.

TIP USE YOUR SYLLABUS, TEXTBOOK HEADINGS, OR TEACHER'S NOTES TO IDENTIFY THESE SECTIONS.

4. Learn in Layers



- First pass: Identify the key terms and concepts.
- Second pass: Learn how these terms connect.
- Third pass: Dive into details and examples.
