Positive school experiences result when students attend regularly, are provided a positive learning environment with opportunities to shine, and are **encouraged to be the best they can**.

This fortnight, I am pleased to report that at Kariong Mountains High School, our students are ticking boxes in many of these areas:

Let's Celebrate Positive Attendance

As shared many times now, attendance is a **collective responsibility** of students, parents and staff. This year, the school has been focusing on late arrivals to improve the number of students attending at or above 90%, in line with department expectations.

I am pleased to report, that in the past twelve months, student attendance at or above 90% has increased by 10% to be 60% of the student cohort. This is a great achievement, testament to the school's partnerships with families and students, working to improve in this area. Thank you, to our school community for this significant improvement.

Student Voice

This week, the Director, Mr Adam Boulus, attended Kariong Mountains High School to work with a group of students on their perspective of teaching and learning at the school.

Students were encouraged to discuss aspects of belonging, attendance, behaviour and wellbeing. The information collected will be used to inform staff of areas of improvement to better support our students.

House System Review

This year, the school is conducting a review of the **school house** system, in line with our **Positive Behaviour for Learning** focus and expanding the leadership model to include our junior students.

With colder weather upon us, it is time to get your winter school uniforms in order, including tops. There have been numerous articles in past newsletters, outlining the many reasons why consistent wearing of full school uniform is important. For me, the wearing of uniform follows our core value of Respect.

Students, who are out of uniform, are to report to me before 8:50am with a note from home explaining why (I appreciate that there are multiple possible reasons) and I will issue a pass to be retained for the day. Alternatively, students can submit the note to their check-in teacher, who can also issue a pass. Check-in teachers will issue a pass to all students out of uniform and will only record on Compass students without a note from home. Throughout the day, other teachers will ask for the pass, if one is not produced a Compass entry will be recorded.

Students, who are out of uniform, without a note from home, will serve a detention each day they do not comply.

A friendly reminder that our Uniform Shop is open on Tuesdays and Fridays between 8am and 9am.



Excursions and Extra-Curricula Activities

There are numerous extra-curricula activities occurring at the moment. Students are encouraged to participate in these activities whilst ensuring they are not over-committing. Regular classwork should be the main priority for all students. Any work missed because of attendance at an excursion needs to be caught up and is a condition of participation.

Students can have their access to these opportunities removed if they do not meet our behaviour standards at school. Full school uniform is required as well.

As I have said many times in the past, our students' behavour during these activities is invariably outstanding and the school has been frequently **praised** for this. I am sure it will continue into the future.

ENGLISH NEWS


Year 7 are reading novels that explore New Places & New Experiences. They're delving into other cultures and learning what life is like outside our borders, including Afghanistan, Poland and other far off places.



Year 8 are reading Crime Fiction with a focus on the novel 'The Fall'. Rumour has it that some lucky students are solving crime on the side and that there may be a seedy underbelly to KMHS with staff and students alike implicated in these crimes... Who do you suspect?

Who Framed Ms Richmond?

Alongside our novel study, Ms Richmond's Year 8 class have been tasked to solve the mystery of 'Who framed Ms Richmond?'. As the term progresses, students in 8A will work together as clues unfold to decipher who the culprit is.



Each student has a role to play; spread across **suspects**, witnesses, informants, red herrings and of course a lead detective. Our current suspect list is long, but progress in the investigation has determined someone in 8A framed Ms Richmond for setting the English storeroom alight. Who could it be?

Year 9 are exploring the unit 'All the World's a Stage', focusing on Shakespeare's comedies. In class, they are reading a play and viewing a recorded performance. Where possible, they will also watch a modern adaptation to highlight the timeless and relevant themes in Shakespeare's work. Their assessment will take the form of an exam-style paper featuring short answer questions and an extended response.



are studying the unit 'Villainous Heroes', with a focus on one of Shakespeare's tragedies. Students are engaging in both creative and analytical activities in class, which will lead up to their assessment task - a speech at the end of term. We are also excited to offer students the opportunity to attend a live performance of the play Macbeth in Sydney, organised by the English Faculty.



Year 11 are halfway through their Preliminary studies and understanding the demands of senior study. Getting started early on assessment tasks and getting targeted feedback from their teachers will help them keep improving their results.

Year 12 are working through new modules as they prepare for their upcoming Trial exams - where does the time go? They are to be commended on some fantastic Half Yearly Exam results - keep up the great work, kids!




Poetry Incursion Term 3

Year 7 students visit the library once per week during Check In to read, borrow and return books. This is a key component of our **DEAR** program where students select books that both challenge and interest them. Our Year 7 students continue to demonstrate positive attitudes, wonderful manners and excellent participation during these **DEAR** sessions.

Year 7 students are also coming to the library once per fortnight during their English lessons to broaden their reading experiences and skills. Students have commenced the **Premier's Reading Challenge** and are busy reading their challenge books and recording their books in their online reading log. Year 7 Introduction to Library Resources & Research Skills

Our Year 7 students were introduced to some key resources during Term 1 to support their learning and study here at KMHS. Students had the opportunity to learn how to access book catalogues in **My School Library, Learn Path, World Book Online, ClickView** and practise more effective searches using Google whilst working through their assessment in BARA.

We encourage students to continue using these resources via their **DoE Student Portal** both at school and remotely. These resources are useful for all subjects and year levels.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- ► category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- ► level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The **NCCD** provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The **NCCD** will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process.

The 2025 NSW Premier's Reading Challenge is now open and Kariong Mountains High School is excited to be participating!

What is the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge?

The PRC is a statewide Challenge that encourages students to develop a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students and enables them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition, but a challenge to encourage each student to **read, to read more, and to read more widely**.

All students who complete the challenge and have their reading record validated by the school's PRC coordinator (Mrs Kirkland) will receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW.

How many books do students need to read?

Students in Year 7 to Year 10 are challenged to read 20 books independently. At least **ten** of these books must be from the relevant Challenge booklists, and up to 10 books can be personal choice books. If a book is from an approved PRC series, students can enter up to 5 books as Challenge books, and can read up to 10 other books from the same series as Personal Choice books. More information on the rules of the Challenge can be found on the PRC website.

Books must be added to a student's online reading record by **Friday**19 **September 2025** in order for their reading record to be validated and receive a certificate.

How do students log their reading?

Students can access the PRC's Student Experience site using their DoE username and password, or can log into the site via the Student Portal. A video guide explaining how to use the Student Experience site can be found here: https://vimeo.com/264540639

How can students find books on the NSW PRC challenge lists?

Our school library has a great selection of books for students to choose from. Students just need to look for the Premier's Reading Challenge stickers on the spines of our library books. Library staff are available to assist students with their reading selections.

A quick guide for logging books:

- Login to the Student experience site using your DoE student username and password.
- 2. Use the blue search bar to search for books you have read.
- 3. If the title appears, click "Add to Reading Log" to add it as a PRC book.
- 4. If the title does NOT appear, you will need to enter it as a personal choice book:

How to enter a personal choice book:

- 1. Click on your **profile icon** in the top right hand corner
- 2. Click on "My reading log"
- 3. Fill in the book details under the "Add a Personal Choice book" field and click "add".
